Anticipating New Municipal Building

To renovate or rebuild. Those were the options our Board of Supervisors contemplated a few years ago when we began re-evaluating our current municipal building and our township's needs well into the future.

As you read this, our building is under construction. All of our municipal and police operations have been relocated to a temporary location at 430-450 Lincoln Highway. Our staff will continue to operate and serve our residents and businesses from that location throughout construction, which we estimate will continue for approximately 14-18 months. While all of our services will remain the same in this temporary space, the setup is a bit different. Administrative Offices, Police Department and the Tax Office, permitting and other township functions will all be available at a single counter, instead of the multiple counters available at the municipal building.

Our board and its professionals worked tirelessly to ensure the smoothest transition possible while construction is underway.

I am confident that any inconvenience our residents and business owners endured from driving to this temporary location or attending our Supervisors, Planning Commission or Zoning Hearing Board meetings at Middletown Township's municipal building during construction will be worthwhile once our new building is finished.

Getting back to my initial thought: To renovate or rebuild. Our board, led by Township Manager Matthew Takita, an architect who has worked in public service for more than 30 years, opted to undertake a combination of renovation and rebuilding. Our existing municipal building will be demolished to the shell and reconstructed with brand-new mechanical systems, electrical, HVAC and plumbing.

We are expanding our building's footprint in response to the needs of our community. Our new building will feature a community room that residents, as well as local groups and organizations can use. In anticipating our current needs and growth in the future, we included about 20 percent more space for the police department.

In addition to incorporating state-of-the-art technological advancements to put Falls Township's municipal building at the forefront, the project entails a complete updating of the existing building and integrating functions. Upgrades will include improvements to administration, code enforcement and the fire marshal, finance, parks and recreation, police, tax collector and public works.

Beyond typical renovations, our newly reimagined municipal building will be more welcoming and easier to navigate with a new front vestibule and better signage.

With regular maintenance and good care, our professionals anticipate our municipal building will meet the needs of our community well into the future.

I simply can't wait to see the finished product and invite all of our residents to visit the new space once it is reopened.

Caring for someone with a cognitive condition who wanders is a considerable responsibility. SafetyNet Tracking Systems helps public safety agencies quickly find and bring home loved ones who may be lost.

Falls Township Police can provide your loved one

with a SafetyNet bracelet that they should always wear. Water-proof bracelets feature a radio frequency transmitter that emits a continuous signal. If a loved one is missing, caregivers would contact authorities immediately. Trained search and rescue teams track the signal emitted from the bracelet, locate the missing person and return him or her home safely.

Radio frequency technology can work in densely wooded areas, buildings and shallow water, even when GPS and cellular technology can not.

Falls Seeks to Recoup EIT Funds

The fiscally responsible Board of Supervisors is working to bring \$1,180,000 back to township coffers.

That's the amount of earned income tax that Falls Township estimates it is losing to the City of Philadelphia. Approximately 1,810 Falls residents work in Philadelphia and are therefore assessed the 3.448 percent Philadelphia wage tax. The Sterling Act, which was enacted in 1932, prevents municipalities from collecting the EIT from residents who work in Philadelphia.

The governing body is hopeful that that may change. The board unanimously approved a resolution to request an amendment to the Sterling Act, which, if enacted, would allow Falls to collect its 1 percent EIT from Falls residents who work in Philadelphia.

Recouping lost EIT monies will not happen "unless and until the legislature amends the Sterling Act," township attorney Lauren Gallagher told the board. With the exception of Philadelphia, Falls residents who work in other municipalities still pay their EIT to Falls Township. If the Sterling Act were to be amended, Falls Township residents would still pay the same in earned income taxes. However, instead of paying the full Philadelphia wage tax, a portion of their tax (up to 1%) would be paid to Falls Township.

The township enacted an EIT in January. Taxes are assessed on all income earned from working. Social security, unemployment compensation and pensions are not subject to an earned income tax.

Supervisor Erin Mullen noted that residents attended earlier meetings and expressed displeasure at the board's inability to collect an earned income tax from those working in Philadelphia. Mullen said she hopes residents will be "satisfied" that Falls and other townships "are trying something" to resolve the problem.

Board Plans Pedestrian Safety Upgrades

With an eye on public safety, the Falls Township Supervisors set the wheels in motion for greater pedestrian protection along a state-owned roadway.

The Supervisors unanimously approved a proposal from Remington & Vernick Engineers to install rectangular rapid flash beacon traffic control devices on New Falls Road and Vermillion Drive. Even though New Falls Road is owned by the state, Supervisor Vice Chairman Jeff Boraski said the township is sponsoring the pedestrian improvements.

"The Township felt it was in our best interest and the residents' best interest to move forward with this project," said Boraski.

Driving along New Falls Road from Penn Valley Road to Tyburn Road, you can see a couple of memorials in place, Boraski said.

The walkways will be equipped with wired push buttons for crossing on both sides of the crosswalk, Boraski said, adding that the township will call on police to step up enforcement in the area.

"We've had some incidents there and probably more close calls than you can imagine," he said. "We want the traffic to stop to allow these children and their families to cross safely."

Boraski added that the project is "a step in the right direction" in improving safety along New Falls Road.

Township Manager Matthew Takita said he anticipates the project concluding by the end of 2023.



Rectangular rapid flash beacons are designed to increase driver awareness of pedestrians crossing roadways at marked midblock crossings. The beacons consist of rectangular shaped amber LED lights installed below pedestrian warning signs.

The pedestrian safety upgrades are expected to cost \$57,177 based on Remington & Vernick Engineers' proposal.

Falls Township will collect all yard waste, as well as leaves, on Saturday, November 4, Saturday, November 11 and Saturday, December 2.

We will not accept yard waste with the regular trash.

Leaves **MUST** be bagged in 30-gallon biodegradable **PAPER BAGS** or placed in 30-gallon trash containers **WITHOUT LIDS**.

They are to be placed curbside by 6

a.m. on the designated collection day in the same location as your regular trash pickup. LEAVES IN ANY OTHER CONTAINER WILL NOT BE COLLECTED.

Christmas trees will also be collected at an upcoming date. This collection date will also be put on the Township website and Facebook page.

Trees will not be picked up with the regular trash.

Fall Yard Advice for Conservation

Leave the Leaves: Leaves provide food, shelter and nesting to a variety of wildlife and insects, such as moth and butterfly pupae;

Build a Brush Shelter: Branches, sticks and leaves can be used to make brush piles that shelter native wildlife;

Leave the Seeds: Perennials and grasses should be left standing over winter (seed-bearting perennials such as purple coneflower, Joe Pye weed and sunflowers provide valuable food for songbirds;

Avoid Chemical Fertilizers: Grass clippings and mulched leaf litter can provide plant nutrition; chemical fertilizers can reduce beneficial insects.



No refrigerators, air conditioners or freezers. No electronics, including TVs, computer equipment, stereo equipment, or any other electrical item that plugs in or operates on batteries. Best Practices For Recycling

Municipal and state regulations require that residents, commercial establishments, and non-residential establishments recycle all recyclable materials. Commonly recycled materials include:

• Paper – newspaper, office/copy paper, glossy

paper, color paper, cardboard, junk mail, phone books, cereal/ cracker boxes

• Plastic - bottles and jugs No. 1-7

• Glass – clear, green and brown containers

• Metal – aluminum, steel, tin, and bimetal cans and containers

Please check with your hauler for a complete list of acceptable recyclable materials.

Avoid contamination of recycling materials with food or liquids

Materials contaminated with food or liquid cannot be recycled. Here is what you should do:

• Check that the material is recyclable. Look for the recycle symbol on items.

• Rinse jars, bottles, and cans that have visible residue in them. A quick rinse is usually adequate.

• Throw away heavily soiled items.

Acceptable waste is recycled

This question often comes up. People are concerned that not all the materials they put in their recycle bin are recycled. Their concern is that some end up in landfills. This leads some to minimize their recycling efforts. According to several major waste management firms in Montgomery County, all the acceptable recycled materials listed above are being recycled.

You should continue to recycle all the items listed in the first bulleted list above.

Things you should not put in vour recycle bin

• Foam containers and cups, even if they have a recycle symbol on them

• Cups coated with wax or plastic such as soda cups

 Plastic bags such as grocery store bags (You can often take these bags back to the grocery store.)

• Flexible packaging such as chip bags or juice pouches

- Plastic wrap
- Container caps
- Diapers

What Does the Fire Marshal's Office Do?

of five full-time employees. The Director of Emergency Services/Fire Marshal, three Fire Inspector/Firefighters and an Administrative Assistant.

The department completes a wide variety of assignments throughout the year. The primary responsibilities of the office include conducting fire investigations to determine origin and cause, completing life/safety inspections, and responding to all fire and emergency incidents during the day to supplement the local volunteer fire companies.

The department completes life/safety inspections at nearly 1,000 locations annually. These locations include

The Falls Township Fire Marshal's Office is comprised every business, school, hotel/motel, apartment complex and daycare within the township. Collectively the office responded to over 644 fire company incidents in 2022.

The department also completes the additional tasks of reviewing fire detection and suppression plans for new installations and modifications of systems, inspecting the same systems to ensure compliance with regulations, following up on fire company responses to reduce false alarms, conducting fire prevention/safety training sessions, completing incident pre-planning exercises, testing and installing smoke detectors and other miscellaneous tasks as needed.

Put a Freeze on **Winter Fires**

Home fires occur more in winter than in any other season. As you stay cozy and warm this winter season, be fire smart!

Half of all home heating fires occur in the months of December, January and February. Heating equipment is involved in one in every seven reported home fire and one in every six home fire deaths.

Follow these tips to stay safe:

• Keep anything that can burn at least three feet from any heat source like fireplaces, wood stoves, radiators, or space heaters.

• Keep portable generators outside, away from windows, and as far away as possible from your house.

• Have a qualified professional clean and inspect your chimney and vents every year.

• Store cooled ashes in a tightly covered metal container and keep it outside at least 10 feet from your home, any nearby buildings and fences.

Plug only one heat-producing appliance (such as a space heater) into an electrical outlet at a time.

Smoke Alarms Save Lives

There have been far too many unnecessary tragedies due to non-working or missing smoke detectors. Smoke detectors save lives. If you need them, please contact the Fire Marshal's office and we will provide and install them free of charge.

Safety Tips

• Install smoke alarms in every bedroom. They should also be outside each

sleeping area and on every level of the home. Install alarms in the basement.

 Large homes may need extra smoke alarms.

• It is best to use interconnected smoke alarms. When one smoke alarm sounds, they all sound.

• Test all smoke alarms monthly by pressing the "test" button.



• A smoke alarm should be on the ceiling or high on a wall. Keep smoke alarms away from the kitchen to reduce false alarms. They should be at least 10 feet from the stove.

• People who are hard-of-hearing or deaf can use special alarms with strobe lights and bed shakers.

• Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old.

Tips For Safe Snow Removal

While enjoying the winter wonderland, remember these tips to help Falls Township crews clear the roads more quickly and efficiently:

• Mailboxes should be installed in accordance with U.S. Postal Service standards. Mailboxes installed incorrectly and, as a result are struck by a Township plow during snow removal operations, will be the sole responsibility of the property owner to repair.

• Move your vehicles out of the street and into private driveways (this also reduces

the amount of snow you have to shovel).

• During any snow emergency, all vehicles must be removed from roadways.

• Wait to shovel your driveway until the plows have completed their final pass along the curb line or edge of pavement. A pass or two through the neighborhood does not mean the Township is finished with snow removal and your effort to clear



your driveway entrance might be wasted.

• Shovel to the right-hand side of your driveway to reduce the amount of snow pushed back onto your driveways by plows.

• Clear your sidewalk by shoveling and salting within 24 hours of the last evidence of precipitation.

• Do not throw snow from any sidewalk or driveway into the roadway. Doing so is illegal, and you will be cited.

• Keep all receptacles (trash and recycling) on the sidewalk, not in the street.

• If you have an inlet in front of your property, please assist the Township in keeping it clear of snow and ice. This will prevent ice from accumulating and reduce drainage issues when snow begins to melt.

Please be patient during the snow removal process while the Township's plow operators work to clear roadways. We are here to get the roads open

for travel as quickly as possible. Please remember we try to plow the roads from curb to curb to open the roadway as wide as possible. Some residents have no grass buffer between the curb and their sidewalks and snow is plowed onto the sidewalk area. This cannot be avoided. Snow is plowed to the shoulder of the roads to clear the travel areas.

Fast Facts From Waste Management...

...on Waste Removal

When should trash be placed at the curb?

Place trash and recyclables out after 6 p.m. the evening before your pickup day. Place containers so they are not blocked by parked vehicles.

What size containers should I use?

Household waste containers should be between 20 and 35 gallons and may not exceed 50 pounds in weight. Use up to 10 sturdy plastic or metal containers with handles and detachable lids. Recyclables should be placed in a recycle bin or can clearly marked as "Recyclables."

How do I dispose of leftover paint?

Evaporate latex paint by air-drying or mixing with kitty litter, shredded newspaper or other absorbent. Bag and put out with your regular trash.

Which wastes are not acceptable?

We do not accept liquid waste of any type, tree stumps or tires. We do not accept HHW of any type, including insecticides, pesticides, gasoline, waste oil, non-latex paints, varnish, thinners, drain cleaner, pool chemicals, car parts or similar materials as part of your regular waste removal services. Hold all Household Hazardous Waste materials for special HHW collection events.

...on Bulk Items

When are bulk items collected?

Larger items are collected on the second pickup day of the week, sometimes by a second crew.

What type of bulk items are collected?

Examples of regular bulk items include furniture, cabinets, washers and dryers.

How much can I discard at once?

The limit is one bulk item per week.

What about refrigerators?

Some items require an appointment, such as refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners and dehumidifiers containing CFCs. To make an appointment, call (800) 869-5566.

...on Holiday Pickups

What if my pickup day falls on a holiday?

If a scheduled holiday (Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's Day) falls on your regular pickup day, trash and recyclables will be collected on your next regular service day.
