Keep Your Home Safe While Traveling

Consider investing in a security system that includes cameras, motion detectors and alarms.

Install smart bulbs or timers to control your lights. Schedule them to turn on and off at different times.

Double check that all windows and doors are locked before leaving. Deadbolts or additional locks add extra security.

Pause mail and other regular deliveries or ask a neighbor to collect them for you.

Ask a trusted neighbor to keep an eye on your home.

Avoid posting your travel plans on social media.

Install motion-activated outdoor lights, ensuring that entry points and dark corners are well-lit.

Store valuables out of sight from windows.

SafetyNet Tracking Systems



Caring for someone with a cognitive condition who wanders is a considerable responsibility. SafetyNet Tracking Systems helps public safety agencies quickly find and bring home loved ones who may be lost.

Falls Township Police can provide your loved one with a SafetyNet bracelet that they should always wear. Water-proof bracelets feature a radio frequency transmitter that emits a continuous signal. If a loved one is missing, caregivers would contact authorities immediately. Trained search and rescue teams track the signal emitted from the bracelet, locate the missing person and return him or her home safely.

Radio frequency technology can work in densely wooded areas, buildings and shallow water, even when GPS and cellular technology can not.

Falls Township Police has created a tip line allowing the public to contact the police department anonymously. Members of the public are encouraged to report suspicious individuals or activity. Tips are then analyzed and passed on to the appropriate division for follow-up. Because the tip line is anonymous, the sender will not receive a response. The tip line is not an emergency number. If you witness a crime in progress or have an emergency that

requires the police, please call 911.

For the lifeguard position, candidates must be at least 15 years old and have a current Lifeguard/First Aid/AED certification. The starting pay rate for lifeguards is \$15 per hour. Falls Township covers all costs (physical, drug test, background checks). In addition, Falls will reimburse for lifeguard certification and recertification costs (50 percent at the end of the first year and the remaining 50 percent at end of the second year). Penns Grant Park Getting Facelift



Improvements and several new additions are planned for Penns Grant Park.

The park, which is nestled in the Penns Grant neighborhood, will have a new swing set and playground for kids ages 2-12 installed.

Other upgrades include resurfacing the park's two tennis courts and including lines for pickleball play.

The addition of Safety Town – a miniaturized version of Falls Township – is a great place for young children to ride scooters, bikes and big wheels and learn about street safety. The buildings and storefronts will have open doors and windows and will be designed for interactive play.

Township Manager John Shepherd is hopeful that the Township will be successful in securing a grant from T-Mobile to cover the cost of the Safety Town addition.

A Story Walk consisting of 10 to 20 stands is planned along the park's walking paths. As families stroll the path, they come across a stand, or a page of a book. As each page is read, the family walks to the next stand to continue reading. Stands are designed to be swapped out for new books to keep the feature fresh and exciting. Parks and Recreation held a community yard sale last year, which raised funds to cover the cost of the Story Walk addition and future maintenance.

'Archie's Heroes' Honors Local Volunteers

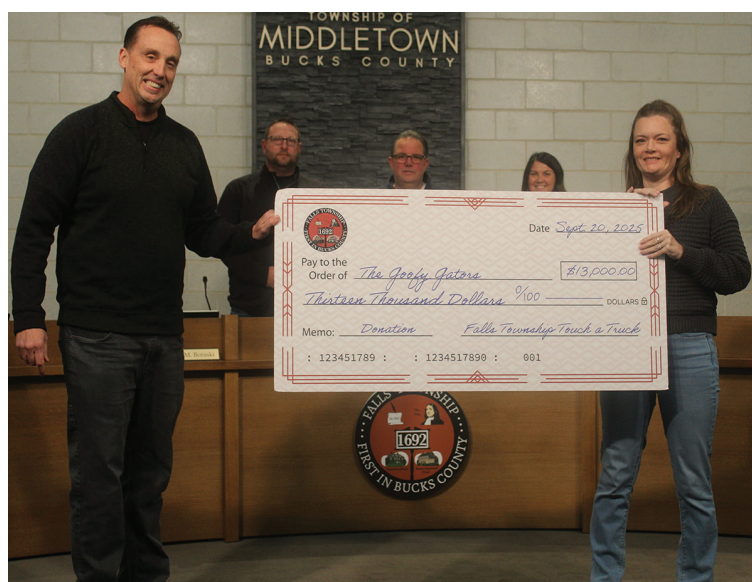

Traffic Signal Upgrades Get Greenlight

The Hood Boulevard and Pennsbury East High School intersection will be upgraded with modernized traffic signalization.

The Falls Supervisors voted unanimously to accept a proposal from Remington & Vernick Engineers which furthers a long-awaited Green Light Go state grant project and includes \$259,800 in funding for the improvements.

The main traffic upgrade components feature the addition of a left turn phase for drivers traveling eastbound on Hood Boulevard turning left into the high school driveway, as well as the addition of new signal equipment including mast arms, signal heads, detection systems, and Americans with Disabilities Act standards for accessible design.

Remington & Vernick's proposal focuses on designing, engineering and inspection services related to the project. In addition, the firm would also publicize the bidding process for the project, answer any construction-related questions, oversee construction, and attend the activation of the traffic signals and review the installation to ensure conformity with contract documents.

The project is expected to be completed by fall.

"This is much needed," Supervisors Chairman Jeff Dence said of the project.

Remington & Vernick's cost of services is \$55,500, which is eligible toward the Township's required 20 percent match for the traffic improvement upgrades.

Pennsbury H.S. Project Advances

Following an extensive review process, the Falls Township Supervisors unanimously granted preliminary and final land development approval to Pennsbury School District to replace the existing East and West high school buildings with a new unified ninth- through 12th-grade campus on Hood Boulevard.

Construction is expected to begin later this year with an opening for the 2029-2030 school year, officials said previously.

The 497,000-square-foot, three-story building would be built on the south side of the existing campus, allowing the current high school buildings to remain operational throughout the construction period. In addition to the high school, a 7,150-square-foot bus maintenance garage, 1,837-square-foot transportation office, 2,400-square-foot field maintenance building and 684-square-foot

concession/bathroom building would be constructed on the site.

Once construction is complete, the two high schools, Village Park Elementary School, several accessory buildings, and parking areas would be demolished.

The board's approval comes on the heels of a Planning Commission approval, as well as an OK from the Bristol Township Council for the portion of school district property located in that municipality.

Supervisor Chairman Jeff Dence said that Township professionals have spent the last six months reviewing the school district's plans.

School officials have said the project is estimated to cost \$270 million.

Geese Management Efforts Continue

In an effort to be fiscally responsible while ridding Falls Township Community Park of Canada geese, the Falls Township Supervisors approved a multi-faceted, year-long geese mitigation plan.

Stepped up geese management efforts began in 2015 and have significantly reduced the number of geese at the park, Falls Township Parks and Recreation Director Brian Andrews has said. Before mitigation efforts began, 100 to 120 resident geese frequented the park. Officials have said that number has been reduced significantly.

"This is very effective," Supervisors Chairman Jeff Dence said. "The dogs chase them off the soccer fields. The geese learn very quickly."

For 2026, the Supervisors unanimously approved awarding a year-long contract to Yardley-based Geese Chasers of Southeastern PA at a rate of \$1,440 per month for a total of \$17,280 for the year – the same price Falls paid for geese mitigation services in 2025. Geese mitigation rates for subsequent years are proposed to increase \$10 per month. For 2027, Geese Chasers proposed a monthly rate of \$1,450 and for 2028, \$1,460 per month.

The all-encompassing program will emphasize nest clearing and maintenance. During the 12-week nesting season, Geese



Chasers will make multiple daily visits to the park, according to the proposal. As part of the maintenance phase, Geese Chasers will make daily visits as needed to "maintain a virtually geese-free environment year-round," the wildlife company wrote in the proposal.

"This frequent harassment will eventually clear any resident geese from your property and keep them from returning and nesting," Geese Chasers wrote in the proposal.

Geese Chasers will use border collies

twice daily to chase geese out of the park.

"Our maintenance program assures that the geese in the area know that your property is not a safe place for them," according to the proposal. "Our program triggers the predatory response inherent in geese. Also, any migrating geese looking for a place to feed, roost or nest will move on when exposed to our methods."

The company will concentrate its efforts on Falls Township Community Park's lake, lake perimeter, marshes, creek, canal area, fields, and common ground.

Capital Improvements Include Road, Rink, Dock and Field Repairs

Several projects are planned for Township parks this year, including upgrades to the hockey rink at Falls Township Community Park to address drainage issues, continuation of the soccer field maintenance program, baseball field repairs; repair of the docks at the Quaker Penn Park boat launch; and improvements at Kirby Park.

At Pinewood Pool, plans call for a new vacuum, chairs and security cameras to help prevent thefts from vehicles.

In addition to parks and recreation upgrades, Falls is planning the full-depth reconstruction of Willow Drive, as well as mill and overlay repairs, upgrades to the South Olds Boulevard culvert and repairs at Martins Creek.

Falls Supervisors Seek Recycling Grant

If you could spend \$7,000, but know that you would recoup another \$50,000 or more why wouldn't you do it?

The Supervisors approved a grant writing proposal that's expected to substantially pay the Township much more than its initial investment. The forward-thinking board approved a proposal from F.X. Browne, Inc./Bogia Engineering, Inc. for completion of the Township's annual Act 101 recycling grant application for 2025.

Falls receives more than \$50,000 each year from the grant. The 2022 grant yielded \$108,141.54.

Grant amounts are based on total tonnage for residential and commercial properties. F.X. Browne, Inc., as part of its proposal,

will obtain valid documentation needed for the application.

The company has submitted the Township's grant applications for more than 20 years.

Residents and businesses are encouraged to recycle as much material as possible. Every little bit helps increase the amount of potential grant funds.

Haulers make it even easier to recycle with single-stream recycling, which allows for paper, plastic, and cans to be commingled in the same container. Recycling materials can be placed in any receptacle, provided it's marked as being recycled and not mistaken for trash.

Best Practices for Recycling Material

Municipal and state regulations require that residents, commercial establishments, and non-residential establishments recycle all recyclable materials. Commonly recycled materials include:

- Paper – newspaper, office/copy paper, glossy paper, color paper, cardboard, junk mail, phone books, cereal/cracker boxes
- Plastic – bottles and jugs No. 1-7
- Glass – clear, green and brown containers
- Metal – aluminum, steel, tin, and bimetal cans and containers

Please check with your hauler for a complete list of acceptable recyclable materials.



Acceptable waste is recycled

This question often comes up. People are concerned that not all the materials they put in their recycle bin are recycled. Their concern is that some end up in landfills. This leads some to minimize their recycling efforts. According to several major waste management firms in Bucks County, all the acceptable recycled materials listed above are being recycled.

You should continue to recycle all the items listed to the left in the first bulleted list.

Things you should not put in your recycle bin

- Foam containers and cups, even if they have a recycle symbol on them
- Cups coated with wax or plastic such as soda cups
- Plastic bags such as grocery store bags (You can often take these bags back to the grocery store.)
- Flexible packaging such as chip bags or juice pouches
- Plastic wrap
- Container caps
- Diapers

Avoid contamination of recycling materials with food or liquids

Materials contaminated with food or liquid cannot be recycled. Here is what you should do:

- Check that the material is recyclable. Look for the recycle symbol on items.
- Rinse jars, bottles, and cans that have visible residue in them. A quick rinse is usually adequate.
- Throw away heavily soiled items.

Running Generator Correctly Vital For Your Safety

Downed utility lines, power company blackouts or summer storms can all lead to power outages. Portable generators are a temporary solution to power appliances. It's important to know that portable generators emit carbon monoxide (CO), a poisonous, deadly gas.

Use these tips to avoid CO exposure:

- Use portable generators outdoors in well-ventilated areas at least 20 feet (7 meters) from all doors, windows and vent openings. Measure the distance from the generator to the building.
- Never use a generator in an attached garage, even with the door open.



• Place generators so that the exhaust fumes can't enter the home through windows, doors or other openings in the building. The exhaust must be directed away from the building.

• Make sure to install carbon monoxide (CO) alarms in your home. Follow manufacturer's instructions for correct placement and mounting height.

• Turn off generators and let them cool down before refueling. Never refuel a

generator while it is hot.

• Store fuel for the generator in a container that is intended for the purpose and is correctly labeled as such. Store the containers outside of living areas.

You Can Help Fireflies Thrive

Would you like to see more fireflies? Start in your own backyard. Helping fireflies—also known as lightning bugs—starts with how we care for our landscapes. From reducing light pollution to ditching pesticides, small changes can help these glowing insects thrive.

Firefly populations in North America have been declining for years. While it's difficult to pinpoint one singular cause, scientists have identified a few major culprits. As more land is developed and natural areas are replaced with lawns, fireflies lose the moisture-rich environments they depend on. Additionally, as we move away from wild, diverse landscapes to more manicured, predictable ones, we're removing the places where fireflies thrive.

Light pollution also plays a critical role. Bright streetlights and other artificial lights can disrupt the firefly's natural mating rituals. Their glow can easily get lost in the glare, making it harder for them to find a mate and reproduce. And pesticides, especially those used in home lawn care, are another threat. These chemicals can kill firefly larvae, adults, and the soil-dwelling invertebrates they rely on for food.

The good news is that we can help reverse these trends starting at home.

Fireflies spend most of their lives as larvae living in the soil and leaf litter, hunting snails, slugs, and worms in the dark. They pupate underground before emerging as adults for just a few short weeks to find a mate and start the cycle again.

Spring: As soil warms, firefly larvae awaken. They hunt small prey in moist leaf litter and soil.

What you can do:

- Avoid disturbing garden beds too early.
- Skip chemical treatments and let the ground stay damp and wild.

Summer: Adults emerge and begin their glowing courtship

dances.

What you can do:

- Turn off outdoor lights to help them find each other.
- Let parts of your yard stay unmanicured and pesticide-free.

Fall: Eggs laid in summer hatch into larvae, which burrow into the soil or leaf litter to overwinter.

What you can do:

- Leave the leaves, especially under trees and along garden edges. These insulating layers are essential shelter.

Winter: Larvae lie dormant in the cold, protected by soil and decaying leaves.

What you can do:

- Resist the urge to clean up.

If you want to keep fireflies shining brightly, one of the simplest steps is to reduce light pollution.

In addition, fireflies love moist environments, especially near water.

What you can do:

- Use motion-sensing lights and dim, warm lights around your garden.

• Let some areas of your garden stay wild and natural, with fallen leaves, damp soil, and some shade.

• Adopt a no-mow or low-mow routine for at least part of your yard.

• Instead of using harmful chemicals, try natural alternatives to pesticides.

• Plant native trees that have dense foliage to create shadier spots. Native pines are a great choice.

• Join local conservation efforts.

• Participate in citizen science projects that track firefly populations, like Firefly Watch: <https://www.massaudubon.org/programs-events/community-science/firefly-watch>

Fast Facts From Waste Management...

...on Waste Removal

When should trash be placed at the curb?

Place trash and recyclables out after 6 p.m. the evening before your pickup day. Place containers so they are not blocked by parked vehicles.

What size containers should I use?

Each resident should use their 96-gallon waste and 96-gallon recycling cart supplied by Waste Management. Those with mobility issues can request a 64-gallon cart by calling (800) 869-5566.

How do I dispose of leftover paint?

Evaporate latex paint by air-drying or mixing with kitty litter, shredded newspaper or other absorbent. Bag and put out with your regular trash.

Which wastes are not acceptable?

We do not accept liquid waste of any type, tree stumps or tires. We do not accept HHW of any type, including insecticides, pesticides, gasoline, waste oil, non-latex paints, varnish, thinners, drain cleaner, pool chemicals, car parts or similar materials as part of your regular waste removal services. Hold all Household Hazardous Waste materials for special HHW collection events.

...on Bulk Items

When are bulk items collected?

Larger items are collected on the second pickup day of the week, sometimes by a second crew.

What type of bulk items are collected?

Examples of regular bulk items include furniture, cabinets, washers and dryers.

How much can I discard at once?

The limit is one bulk item per week.

What about refrigerators?

Some items require an appointment, such as refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners and dehumidifiers containing CFCs. To make an appointment, call (800) 869-5566.

...on Holiday Pickups

What if my pickup day falls on a holiday?

If a scheduled holiday (Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's Day) falls on your regular pickup day, trash and recyclables will be collected on your next regular service day.

Electrical Safety Important Around Swimming Pools

If you are putting in a new swimming pool, hot tub or spa, be sure the wiring is performed by an electrician experienced in the special safety requirements of these types of installations.

Outdoor receptacles must have covers that keep them dry even when appliances are plugged into them.

Ground-fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs) are special devices designed to protect against electric shock and electrocution. They are required for most pool, spa or hot tub equipment. They may be in the form of an outlet or a circuit breaker. Test the GFCIs monthly according to the manufacturer's instructions.

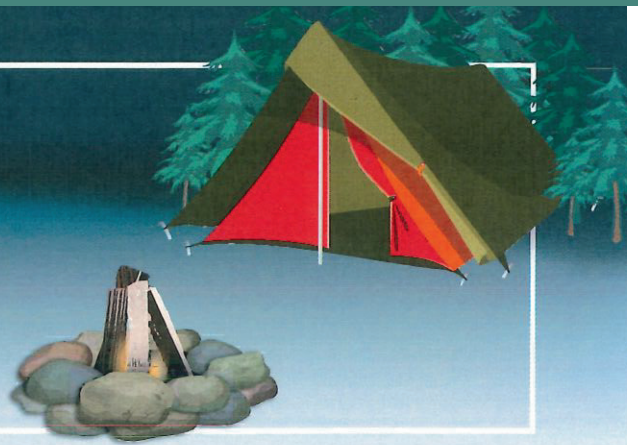
Electrical appliances, equipment and cords should be kept at least 6 feet away from the water. When possible, use battery-operated appliances and equipment such as televisions, radios

and stereos.

Here are more tips to safely enjoy your pool this summer:

- Avoid handling electrical devices when you are wet.
- Make sure that any overhead lines maintain the proper distance over a pool and other structures, such as a diving board. If unsure, contact a qualified electrician or your local utility company to make sure power lines are a safe distance away.
- Do not swim during a thunderstorm.
- Have a qualified electrician periodically inspect and – where necessary – replace or upgrade the electrical devices or equipment that keep your pool, spa or hot tub electrically safe.
- Have a qualified electrician show you how to turn off all power in case of an emergency.

Fire safety



Build campfires at least 25 feet away from tents, shrubs and anything that can burn.

Use propane, charcoal and wood pellet barbecue grills outdoors only. Indoor use can cause a fire or carbon monoxide poisoning.

Place your grill well away from siding and deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches. Do not store or use a grill on a porch or balcony.



Use chimineas, outdoor fireplaces, and fire pits outdoors only and at least 10 feet away from your home or anything that can burn.

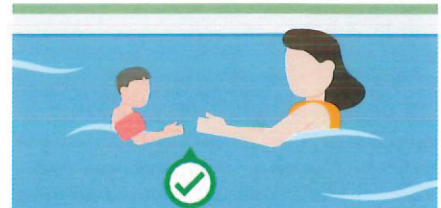

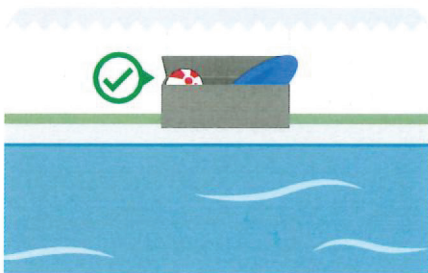
Never swim near a boat, marina or boat launching ramp.

Keep the pool and deck clear of floats, balls and toys after you get out of the pool.

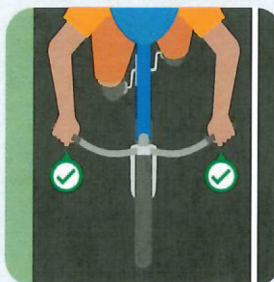


Always swim with a buddy.
